First course in Hebrew, intended for those without prior knowledge of Hebrew. Students who speak some Hebrew should consult with faculty for correct placement before classes begin.

Shared religious practices and stories such as creation, sacrifice, theories of evil and salvation, prophecy and Messianic expectations. Antisemitic background, both Christian and racial; rise of Adolf Hitler and implementation of "the final solution;" responses by Jews and non-Jews in the Western world.
HIST 442 People from our Past	Instructor: Dr. David Cline and Dr. Amos Nadan Time & Location: Tuesday & Thursday 9:30-10:45 AM SSW 2532	Biographical approach to history through lives of prominent and ordinary individuals. ECL 526: American Jewish Literature	۲ ا	This course explores Jewish identity through key texts in Yiddish and American-Jewish literature. It examines questions such as: What does it mean to be Jewish, particularly in America? How do the immigrant experience and the Holocaust shape American-Jewish literature? How do Jews navigate tradition and assimilation, history and personal experience? How do later generations address the Holocaust and antisemitism? We will read works by Sholem eichem, Chaim Grade, Abraham Cahan, Anzia Yezierska, Art Spiegelman, Philip Roth, Allegra Goodman, and James McBride.
